Many thanks to Maria McGrath for making and donating another gorgeous quilt for the **Concert Raffle.** Dr. Dodds drew the winning ticket. The SLA took in \$1,369.00 from raffle sales. The winner of the quilt was Nancy Spilman. Mona Allen won the cord of wood. The community appreciates the generosity of Betsy Kalina and Rob Meyer for allowing the concerts to be performed from their dock. Suggestions are being accepted for next years concert.

Approximately 22 people took advantage of the **Boater Safety Course** organized by VP Jeanette Perry and skillfully taught by Navigation Committee Chair and former SLA President, Ralph Undercoffler. Thank you to both for many years of providing this much needed service to the community.

We had great weather for the **Annual Picnic**. 86 SLA members and guests attended. Delicious grilled treats and camper specialities were served. Our many thanks go to our organizers, cooks and go-fers... especially to Gary and Linda Scott, Randy and Cindy Gadbaw, and Joe and Ann Reilly. Tshirts made by Charlene Oukes were special give aways. Mona Allen has again agreed to chair the event this coming summer.

The **Tour de Camp II** was enjoyed by 23 people and our appreciation is extended to Donna Besaw, SLA Director for organizing the event. Many thanks to Ernie Hutt, Carl and Mary Colton, Dave and Linda Syrek, Dave and Faye Lockwood and Mary Neuroth for generously sharing their camps or homes to the Sylvia Lake Community. The Youth Corps is still in its organizing stage and its purpose and activities are still in development. The bottle drive has been an overwhelming success with over \$150.00 collected to date. There were 10 boats and Shari has made available on the web site a special video of the event. This is the 37th anniversary of the SLA boat parade. We want to thank our retiring parade organizers, Andy and Crystal Leonard. Great job!!

Water quality was discussed at length. Rob Meyers has agreed to Chair the Water Testing Committee. The results of the tests suggest that we may have multiple factors impacting the quality of the water. Rob indicated that he had experience working with DEC in Cranberry Lake and would develop a baseline for the lake at ice-out. (the lake is purest at this time) The coliform test is relatively simple and he feels qualified to conduct the tests. Rob was going to check into purchasing "Watersticks" that can test the water at various depths. It was suggested that we explore the possibility of participating in DEC/Citizen's Statewide Lake Assessment Program available through the NYS Federal of Lake Associations. Lea Dickson indicated that she had joined the organization and would look into the availability of water monitoring training.

The **Beaver Busters** have been active this summer and conducted swamp rat activities to help improve the flow.

Milfoil and other invasive species continue to pose a threat to the lake. Dave and Faye Lockwood have organized the Milfoil III.

Gale Ferguson thanked everyone for their support during his term as President and noted that the sense of community has strengthened as a result of the effort we have made together addressing numerous issues.

The **new slate of officers** was presented by Ann VanSlyke and the nominating committee and the slate was approved.

Once again the Association thanks Shari Barnhart, "Sylvia" for providing

the community with the **web site**. It provides an opportunity for those who love Sylvia to share in her activities even if they are not physically able to be at the lake.

The website has been an invaluable resource for sharing information and has helped the Association communicate with its membership. Betsy Kalina made a motion for a \$300.00 stipend to help defray some of Shari's costs.

Recommended by the **Nominating Committee**, the membership voted to Review the Constitution/ Bylaws and Mission Statement. Many thanks to Ann Vanslyke, Katie Pistolesi and Randy Gadbaw for serving on the committee. It is difficult to say no to Ann. Olive Horning was welcomed as a new member of the committee.

The **Fort Drum** air space was discussed and the lake community will continue to monitor the activities. Gary Scott and Lea Dickson have been serving as the liaison to the Air National Guard Range Tower. Please report any low flying planes over the lake to Lea or Gary and they will call the officers in charge of the range.

Many many **thanks and appreciation to Gale Ferguson** who has dedicated many years to Sylvia Lake monitoring the water flow, busting beavers, improving fishing opportunities, identifying milfoil and providing his fundraising skills that have allowed us to enjoy concerts, and his providing endless print services for the lake community.

Betsy Kalina, outgoing SLA secretary spent countless hours pulling together addresses for the SWAT/PEST Fund mailings at the town hall in Fowler. We owe much of our successful PEST fund drive to her organization skills and time coordinating the mailings.

Faye Hopper, a former President of the SLA just completed her term on the Executive Board. She is valuable resource to the Board and we will continue to rely on her experiences.

The Water Level : It's All About the Flow by Gary Scott

Fall 2005

The cement dam at the outlet of the lake, controls Sylvia Lake's water level. The dam was built by St. Joe (the



mining company) in the late 1960's. Since the 1970's, lake residents have monitored the level of the lake by adding or removing boards in the dam to maintain a consistent flow in spring, summer, and fall. By doing this, the water remains constant even if we have a long dry spell and that helps to keep our lake clean.

Over the years, many, many campers and their kids and relatives have gone down to the dam and beyond to bust beaver dams, remove debris, dynamite (when needed) and canoe or kayak to Harmer's White Talc Road. At Harmers Road, there are three big tubes that the lake water flows through. They are at 10-12 foot level lower than the lake.

Another big water tube is just down from the cement dam and goes under the railroad track. The mouth of this tube has to be cleaned every couple of years at both ends.

Last year, a group traveled from the lake outlet to Harmers Road and cut the trees that fell across the stream. They removed old logs, dug the channel deeper in spots, and generally opened the stream bed up as far as the tubes at Harmers. Once the lake water goes through those tubes, whatever the beaver does, does not effect the level of the lake.

Over the years, the mine companies, D.E.C., Town of Fowler, and caring Sylvia Lakers have helped keep the outlet clear and, as a result, the lake stays as clean as it remains.

Myrna Barney, St Lawrence County Health Department, strongly recommends a filter system be added to your water supply. (a UV light is highly

desirable) Sylvia Lakers are proud of Sylvia's reputation for its clean, pristine waters, however, she would like all of us to consider this extra measure of safety.

Sylvia is home to many mammals, including beaver and otter. Your intake valve is at risk of contamination by bacteria, virus or fuel spills. Please let an officer or director of the association aware of any known illness as a result of your family or guests drinking or swimming in Sylvia.

Navigation Law Update

Personal Watercraft - Minimum Age of Operation

On July 28, 2005 Governor Pataki signed a law amending Section 49, Subdivision 1-a of the Navigation Law raising the minimum age of operators of personal watercraft (PWC) to fourteen (14). This new law will take effect January 1, 2006.

However, in order to minimize the impact on riders currently under the age of fourteen (14) certain allowances have been to phase in this new law.

Until January 1, 2009, those operators age ten (10) through thirteen (13) that have a boating safety certificate may continue to operate a PWC if they are accompanied by:

- * someone over 18 years of age and
- * within 500 feet on another personal watercraft or vessel and
- * within sight of the personal watercraft and
- * holding a safety certificate of their own.

A Boating Safety Certificate is a certificate issued by the Commissioner, the United States Power Squadron, United States Coast Guard Auxiliary, or in the case of a non-resident his/her home state or country, as a result of completing a boating safety course.

This law only affects the operation of PWC's. Anyone over the age of ten (10) that holds a boating safety certificate can still operate a motor boat alone.

Constitution and Mission Statement Review

Joel Hopper has offered to Chair the difficult task of examining the SLA Constitution and Mission Statement. The constitution was first adopted December 11,1969 and has been amended 4 times in the last 37 years. "The Purpose of the Association shall be to preserve, protect, and promote the welfare of Sylvia Lake, its area and environment, for the use and enjoyment of it by the camp and property owners."


